It was frustrating and humbling to finally stop and ask. Within ten minutes of stopping at the convenience store for directions, we found our restaurant. But no self-respecting, trail-blazing man likes to ask for directions, unless....

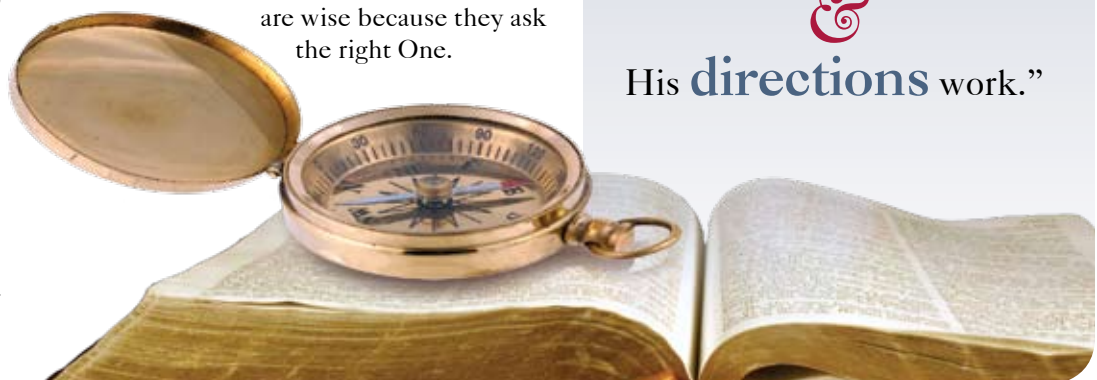

God authored the Bible, and His directions work.

Many times we Christians try to find a balance between God's ideas and man's. The precious “balance” we all seek in life does not come from staking out a median position between the two extremes on every issue of life! What kind of “balance” is that? It would be like trying to balance smart and stupid by choosing “reasonably dumb.” No. Balance is achieved by positioning oneself squarely on the truth.

It is not unusual to be unsure of what the truth is on some particular matter. That's fine. But your choice is to seek direction either from the world's “experts” or God's Word. Even if we don't agree as to what is right concerning a matter, we can agree on where to find out. And we must agree on God's Word as the authority or else we end up with an authority who, no matter how broadminded he may sound or how vigorously he may argue to the contrary, tells us how to live based merely on his opinion.

Although I love my GPS, it is not perfect, and there is no foolproof way to explain to it exactly what I want. This past Sunday I took an unplanned detour because of outdated information in my electronic compass. In the end, wise men do ask directions. But they are not wise because they ask; they are wise because they ask the right One.





Just Give Me the Truth

What is your weather like today? Answering that question is a multimillion-dollar business in our world. While the business may be brisk, it is my contention that the question is seldom answered, and, when answered, it is done poorly. Television is especially low on the thermometer when it comes to telling me what the weather is or what it is going to be. The reason is simple. Media people want big weather events that will capture one's attention rather than simply saying it is 65 degrees and cloudy—simply telling the truth.

Look at the name of local weather programs. "Storm Tracker" comes to mind. How about, "Your Severe Weather Station" or "Storm Center"? When I was a kid, channel four in Nashville had a jingle with which they began their weather report. I don't know that I remember it word for word, but I can come close.

"Is it cold, is it hot?"

Is it cloudy, rain or snow?

Here's the weather man, the guy who'll know!"

Note the choices: cold, hot, cloudy, rain or snow. What! No warm and sunny? Nope. Weather has to have extremes when reported on TV.

Have you ever heard of a weatherman who was called anything less than a meteorologist? What does this guy do? He reads a computer screen! Sure, he may prepare his report, but don't government agencies do that?

Recently, when I was traveling by car with Wil and Tim Thompson from Montana to Tennessee, there was a severe weather system throughout the West and Midwest, including Wyoming, Kansas, Iowa, Missouri and Illinois. These were states through which we had to travel, so we wanted to know the weather on our route. We couldn't get helpful information on radio or television. One TV network had a reporter "on location" with Interstate 80 behind him.

"Conditions throughout the Midwest are very dangerous," he told us as we watched traffic behind him traveling normally at interstate speeds! In an early morning report on the radio from a large city, we heard that conditions were causing accidents; and, over a period of one hour, we heard about the same three accidents five or six times. These accidents, which were without injury, by the way, may have been caused by the weather conditions; but three fender benders in a large city with thousands of vehicles traveling is not what I needed to know. I wanted to know the weather!

"Stay off the roads, unless absolutely necessary," a weatherman said to us on the radio. Obviously, it was necessary for him to be on the road so he could get to the station to tell us to stay off the road!

Just tell me the truth about the weather! In over two thousand miles, we traveled without incident safely. We saw snow on the side of the road, but no cars in it.

What could be more important or exciting than the truth? A lot of things, it seems. Sometimes I think Bible believers are more interested in the way truth is presented than the truth itself. If a preacher hollers and pounds the pulpit (two things of which I am guilty), he is "preaching with power." The more important question is, Does he preach the truth?

The way of presenting the truth has a place of importance, but it is the truth that matters and makes a difference, not the presenter or his interests. That is true with meteorologists, and that is true with God's children.

The ministries here have been centered on the truth for over fifty-five years. The "reporters" have changed. The place has changed. Programs have changed. But the purpose of the ministry here is still to report God's truth.

to consider becoming the Ranch's much-needed cowboy. He must have made quite an impression on her because once he came on staff in May, it only took until January for them to get engaged.

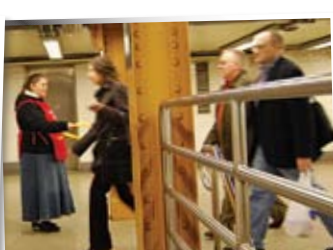
